


Perceptions of Public Education



THOUGHTS ON TOPS

We asked respondents about Louisiana's state-wide college scholarship program, TOPS. In 2016, funding for TOPS was cut due to budgetary constraints. We wondered how people thought the remaining funding should be dispersed among eligible high school graduates. Respondents could choose from three options: 1) Make academic requirements more difficult; 2) Make the program income-based, ensuring funding for

economically disadvantaged students; 3) All students receive the same reduced amount.
